NEWS FROM LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE

On our College Improvement Plan, we make a pledge to our young people that they should all have opportunities whilst at LVC to do the following: visit the theatre, go to a concert, sing, dance, play a musical instrument, try out a sport we do not teach in school, attend a national sporting event, meet a writer, travel abroad, visit an art gallery, set up camp and sleep in a tent, talk to someone who speaks another language in their language, have a conversation with an old age pensioner, do some community service and give a talk in public.

Our enrichment week, this year held in the first week of June, provides all of our students with a chance to tick off many of the opportunities on this list all in one go and I think this year was our most varied programme ever:

Year 7 (11/12 year olds) went to an eco-theme park, visited a long list of museums in the local area, saw a play by Shakespeare at the Globe Theatre, solved a murder mystery and competed in some new sports.

Year 8 (12/13 year olds) were taught how to build gliders and then built them, visited 'Jimmy's Farm', climbed up a wind turbine at an eco-centre and travelled to France on an exchange where they had to speak a good deal of French to their host families.

Year 9 (13/14 year olds) went on residential visits to the galleries of Paris, the volcanoes of Southern Italy, the delights of Cornwall including the Eden Centre, water sports in the South of France and team activities with Granta Special School in the Peak District.

Every single child in the three year groups had an exciting and packed week.

The pressures on us not to run these kind of intensive weeks are very many: the cost to parents is an obstacle (although a Trust Fund is used to support those experiencing financial difficulties), the modern day obsession with risk assessment might persuade many not to run them and the demand on teacher time is very great; not all members of staff are in a position to be away from their families 24 hours a day.

However, even weighing up these problems and the difficulties that need to be overcome, I think enrichment week is a very special part of the offer we make to our young people at the College and, while I remain Principal, it is here to stay.

Dear Friends,

Well the season of gardens and fetes is truly upon us and I've enjoyed three in the space of ten days - although I think I need a bit of a breather before I can look a scone in the face again, yummy though they are. Let's not beat about the bush, putting on a fete takes an enormous amount of hard work usually undertaken by a very small group of people. So three cheers for all those wonderful folk who allow their gardens to be invaded by hordes of people, who give up their time to organise, plan, bake, grow plants, haul boxes of books about, set up games, judged the dog show, sell raffle tickets, manhandle the tea urn, run the Tombola, and jump up and down in the Human Fruit Machine ---- and I've probably missed someone out - but thank you, thank you, for your generosity and community spirit, you all deserve a medal.

If a fete has a Dog Show then as far as I am concerned that's the best bit. I did enter our black Labrador last year but he got a bit over excited to say the least so this year I left him at home in his basket. But what a marvellous assortment of dogs

there are on display at a village dog show! So many different sizes and breeds; puppies and older dogs, smooth haired ones, woolly ones, snappy ones and sappy ones, ones with long legs and fur, ones with wrinkled noses and sad baggy eyes, ones with silky ears and soft, shiny coats, ones exuding joyful friendliness with their wagging tails and ones enduring their owner's determination to enter them in a show with pained resignation. Lots of dogs, all different, all wonderful and all so loved by their owners. And it got me thinking ----

Dogs are who they are, each unique and special in their own way; mercifully those with baggy eyes haven't got the intelligence to request Botox injections, after all the bagginess is what defines their breed. Similarly we human beings are all different, all unique and special, each one of us known and loved by God *for who we are*. We don't have to be perfect - as the poet Mary Oliver writes *You do not have to be good. You do not have to walk on your knees for a hundred miles through the desert, repenting.*

We live in a society that reveres the young, the successful, the beautiful, that holds up an air brushed image of perfection as a model of what it means to be human. God doesn't ask for perfection, only love. Often, we suffer agonies of self-doubt because we compare ourselves to other people and find ourselves lacking; the journey to self-acceptance can be a long and hard one. How liberating to know that our creator God knows the secrets of our hearts *and loves us still*. How extraordinary to learn that however hateful we are, and we can all be hateful at times I think you would agree - we are loved, we are loved, we are loved ---- and in the loving we too, baggy eyes and all - are made lovely.

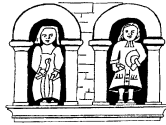

Several pupils from class 4 attended the Winning Post Study Centre at The National Stud. It is designed to help children increase confidence levels areas such as Literacy, Numeracy and ICT. HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE FUTURE OF BRINKLEY
HELP TO PRODUCE A 'VISION' FOR YOUR
VILLAGE

East Cambridgeshire District Council is looking for your views on how your village should change or improve in the future. What sort of place would you like Brinkley to be? What are your priorities for the village and the wider parish? For example, do you want more school places, better local facilities, new homes or more employment opportunities?

The District Council wants to work in partnership with local people and the Parish Council to draw up a long-term Vision for Brinkley. The Vision will set out how Brinkley should develop/improve over the next 20 years. It will look at issues such as:

- local housing needs
- employment opportunities
- sites for development
- the quality of the local environment
- infrastructure and facilities - whether to protect and/or improve

The Vision will be used to guide decisions on future development and planning applications. It will also help ensure that key infrastructure and facilities are retained and enhanced. The Vision will be included in the statutory development plan for the East Cambridgeshire - known as the 'Core Strategy'.

A questionnaire will be available for people's comments from **27th June 2011**. The questionnaire can be viewed on the District Council's website at <http://www.eastcambs.gov.uk/local-development-framework/consultation-village-town-visions>; or paper copies can be obtained by phoning the Forward Planning team on 01353 665555. The website will also have questionnaires for other settlements in East Cambridgeshire (which you are welcome to fill out), as well as other background documents. Comments should be returned by **18th July 2011**. The District Council is keen to get your views, and would like as many people to get involved as possible. Your comments will help to shape a draft Vision for Brinkley. The draft Vision will be published early next year, when there will be a further opportunity to make comments. The final Vision should be published in late 2012, and should hopefully reflect the needs and priorities of the local community.

WORDSWELL

I graduated as a Speech & Language Therapist in 2009, as an under-graduate, with a Bachelor of Science Second Class Honours degree, from Leeds Metropolitan University. I have since been lucky enough to join a profession that has allowed me to work with toddlers to adults, in schools, clinics and homes, providing direct therapy to individuals and advice to parents, education staff and healthcare staff. I joined Wordswell in April 2010 after spending 5 months working within a primary school alongside teachers and learning support assistants.

From a young age I have had a keen desire to be involved within a child's developmental life. From mentoring and babysitting to volunteering in holiday clubs, primary schools and specialist autism schools I have encountered and been amazed at human development. During my sixth form and the decisions of what to study at university a whole variety of occupations were thrown my way. Speech and language therapy as a career came up on several occasions (one being my grandmother sitting beside a so called "speechie" on an airplane and finding it a fascinating career choice), both of which ignited sparks within me where no other occupation idea had done so. I decided to research it further and realised the need of an involvement with speech and language development in affecting an individual's life and prospects. I attended a brief two day "taster" course at St Bartholomew's Hospital in London and

applied to Universities soon after. Leeds Metropolitan was my choice and I enjoyed it thoroughly with a very close knit and supportive team of lecturers and mentors.

My three years study set me up through lectures and hands-on experience within hospitals, child development centres, special schools, clinics and mainstream schools. The wide variety of placements with adults, children and families enabled me with a sturdy knowledge of where in the profession I would like to work. I have a keen interest in autism which I intend to expand on in the future. At Wordswell I have the pleasure of seeing children and teenagers on the autistic spectrum (from high-functioning Aspergers to lower functioning autism), with Down's syndrome, with phonology (speech sound) difficulties, with language delay and with cochlear implants. I have also met adults with voice concerns.
