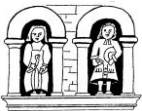

NEWS FROM LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE

As we all know Linton Village College is in a pretty area of rural Cambridgeshire. There isn't much of a cultural mix in the local villages in our catchment area and it is for this reason that the school's link with a South African Township school is so vital to us. I have now visited the township twice with groups of students and my most recent visit coincided with the beginning of the summer holiday.

Before I tell you about the recent visit, let me set the scene a little. Soshanguve Township is a sprawling mass of breeze-block buildings and some informal dwellings called shacks, made of corrugated metal. The township houses millions of black South Africans: there are no white people living there at all. The reason for this is that during the apartheid years, black South Africans were not allowed to live in white areas like those in the nearby city of Pretoria. They lived away from the city and journeyed in to work each day crowded into large taxis. Since the end of apartheid and Nelson Mandela's presidency, there are now no laws governing where people of different race and colour can live in South Africa, but the settlements have changed very little. More of the shacks have been converted to houses, KFC and McDonalds have moved in and the standard of living for many has improved. However, the area is still exclusively black and, in places, depressingly poor.

Our visits to the township are special because we stay with families close to the school. This in itself is something of an event: news spreads that a group of white English people are in town and we become a spectacle to be waved at, honked at and photographed.

On this occasion we arrived, rather splendidly, on Nelson Mandela Day, 18th July. Mandela's national day is on his birthday, but is not a holiday. Instead, the ex-president has decreed that South African citizens should do 67 minutes of community service during the day: a minute for each of the 67 years that Mandela served his country. The day began with a celebration of Mandela's life with singing and dancing in assembly and concluded with the school community visiting local crèches to read stories to toddlers. We joined in and, in addition, cleared the school field of rocks and marked out a boundary line so that games could involve rules about what was in or out of play. On the following days, we unpacked the sports equipment we had brought and began to coach 30 designated young people to become Sports leaders. The Boepathutse learners were very keen and picked up sports leadership skills with impressive speed. The visit ended with a festival of sport organised by Linton and Boepathutse together.

The hardest part of the experience for some is staying in the homes. These are sometimes crowded and noisy. The food can be challenging: boiled chicken feet are a delicacy, for example, but in a way that is

what is special about it. The warmth of the welcome more than compensates for any slight discomfort. Most people who visit South Africa have little idea how ordinary people live.

We hope we have left something behind us that lasts: the laptops we gave to the teachers should improve research and teaching, the sports equipment should enable a greater variety of activities to be experienced and the money we donated to the feeding scheme will be used to create a dining shelter for the poorest children. What I do know is that the trip has made a difference to Linton. Our experiences there are ones we will never forget.

## **EAST CAMBS DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' NOTES**

### **Keeping Our Roads Clear**

There have been problems on a road in this ward when waste collection vehicles and a fire engine were obstructed by parked cars. The Council afterwards wrote to all households in the road, but this could potentially happen anywhere.

It is an offence to obstruct a road if it can be avoided and the Police may issue Fixed Penalty Notices if found. A virtually straight corridor at least 3.1 metres (10ft 3in) wide should be left for emergency vehicles, waste collection and road sweeping vehicles, lorries and delivery vans to pass freely. Such vehicles may be over 8 metres (26 ft) long. Please, always ensure there is enough clearance when parking near a vehicle on the other side of the road.

Please do not park on the road if you have a driveway or garage space.

Insurance claims for a damaged vehicle may be difficult if it were causing an obstruction or was parked unnecessarily on the road.

For decades, new properties have been granted planning permission with the expectation that at least two cars are parked off-road. Extensions to existing properties have been permitted provided that off-road parking space is not reduced to one car or zero.

### **Newmarket's Community Reuse and Recycling Centre**

The charity, Newmarket Open Door, now runs the Recycling Centre in Depot Road, Newmarket, which was previously run by Suffolk County Council. It is open every day, 10am until 4pm. Items for recycling are accepted free of charge. These include: glass, metal, foil, paper, cardboard, batteries, electrical items, plastic food and drink containers, cardboard cartons, cooking oil, motor oil, and re-sellable items. These earn money for the charity, which also runs two shops which sell furniture, electrical equipment, books, tools, clothing, linen etc. Domestic items for which the charity has to pay for disposal are charged an entry fee of £3 per car, £6 for an estate car and £12 for a van or trailer. These include rubbish, garden waste and wood. Newmarket Open Door helps homeless and vulnerable young adults.

This site may be more convenient for residents to use than the Cambridgeshire County Council site near Milton.

### **Anglesey Abbey's Car Park**

The Council has granted planning permission for extensions to the National Trust's car park at Anglesey Abbey. The existing car park will be widened and lengthened to double the existing area. One condition for the permission is that the area known as The Paddocks in the village may not be used for parking without further permission. An improved path

running to the far end of the car park will enable a link over the Trust's land to The Lodes Way to Wicken Fen.

Pauline is off at the moment so I have the pleasure in writing this month's letter.

It seems incredible to think that we are in autumn already! For some autumn is 'the end of the summer', with nothing to look forward to until Christmas, and the prospect of cold weather and grey skies. For others it's a special time - shortening days, that hint of crispness in the morning air, smoke rising from chimneys in the evening, the smell of woodsmoke. Time to dig out the thicker clothes and the wellie boots, Harvest festival and apple scrumping.

Harvest festival is a recent tradition within the Church of England - introduced by the Revd Robert Hawker in 1843 as a way of bringing his parishoners living on the rugged Cornish coast together to say "thank you" for the harvest from the land and sea. Nowadays few people live and work on the land and few will have any idea if this year has been a good or bad harvest. We get our food from supermarkets and so are divorced from the reality of producing and harvesting crops.

But whilst our personal experience of harvest may have changed, the concept of celebrating the harvest and giving thanks for all we have is just as valid today as back in Hawker's time. And when we see the reports of what is happening in East Africa where

harvests have failed, we are reminded even more how much we have to be thankful for.

Meister Eckhardt, a medieval mystic, said, "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is "thank you", it will be enough." Let this be a time to say "thank you" for each one of us. With all God's blessings
